Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers

As we move towards Spring time and lighter evenings and brighter mornings, it affords some time for reflection, particularly following our recent Ofsted visit. I am looking forward to sharing more details around this process with you, hopefully before the end of the term.

One of the things I have been reflecting on, has been the students' exemplary behaviour over these two days in particular. The Ofsted team were so complimentary about our students and their loyalty to teaching staff, their friends and wider community and they were enthused about their helpfulness and their eagerness to assist when asked. We have been completing a big piece of work around behaviour as you know, redefining our vision and ensuring that all understand that good learning behaviours afford opportunity and fulfilment of hopes and ambitions. I am really pleased with the response to this work and delighted that in turn, we are seeing a significant reduction in poor behaviours, reduction in the number of serious sanctions awarded and reduction in detentions and parks being issued. Everything we do around behaviour is to ensure teachers can teach and students can learn. What I am most proud of, is that we do this without compromise and remaining inclusive, responsive and nurturing of our student's needs. Our system isn't the 'zero tolerance' policy used in some schools, where one misdemeanour would have you removed from class; and in turn, we have a whole range of provisions we deploy when it is clear that young people are having a challenging time. We have access to counsellors, trained 'emotional logic' practitioners, a staffed and resourced 'stepping stones' room, non-teaching pastoral support staff and a non-teaching safeguarding team. Our methodology of seeking to resolve, repair and move on affords our young people with the opportunity to change paths and seek resolutions to what might have gone wrong previously.

I am particularly excited about our reward evenings that are scheduled for later in the year. These will be our first 'formal' award presentation evenings for many years and are the positive affirmation and culture that we strive to make as important as the behaviour system's punitive parts. All children should feel that they are able to achieve 'excellence' daily. I have reiterated to the children several times that learning is difficult and requires hard work and resilience. It is much easier to give up when things are challenging, than it is to hold firm and keep trying. Nevertheless, the rewards are significantly greater when we strive for something and are then successful. A 'growth mindset' is crucial in fostering this attitude, a belief in that you can't do something 'yet' as opposed to 'can't do

it at all.' I am hopeful that as our Year 11 and Year 12s go into their next mock series, that they are able to channel this belief and as a result, enter their summer examinations confidently. Careful planning of revision and preparation will no doubt improve the chances of this. Please do remind your youngsters of the many programmes that are available to support them including GCSE Pod, Sparks, My Maths and Seneca.


Calling all Parents and Carers


Want to make a difference?

The College is looking for complete chess sets for use in a College initiative.


