# **Forensic Reading**

For many young people today reading is not a routine part of their experience and we believe that this is a loss. We believe that the promotion of reading, a love of finding out new ideas and experiencing new worlds is central to the development of informed adults

> who establish a passion for lifelong learning and an enhanced level of vocabulary. We would like our students to enjoy reading and to challenge their understanding of how great writers write. We would like students to become more informed and to be in a position can participate an incisive

more critical, more confident, and in the future where they in debate and discussion in and articulate manner.

Callington Community College in investing considerable time and effort in trying to build our students' love of reading. It is great to see so many of our young people engaged in daily reading and talking with passion about the books they read. Despite this, staff and parents will often cite that many students find it a real challenge to do themselves justice in examinations, as they struggle to decode challenging texts and then use the complex academic vocabulary, required to be successful. We must deliberately and intentionally plan to address this hence the implementation of the Forensic Reading programme across all WeST Secondary Schools.

What is Forensic Reading? The aim of Forensic

Reading is to develop our learners' analytical skills and build confidence in reading. Callington holds reading in high regard and, through the Forensic Reading program, wants to promote high level reading skills as well as an expansive vocabulary and cultural understanding in our students; skills that will benefit them in exams and in the wider world. The aim of Forensic Reading is also about students being able to converse articulately about issues and ideas within society and being able to engage in these conversations confidently. Forensic Reading will expose our students to challenging, complex and academic texts which will not only develop their vocabulary but also their ability to appreciate what makes a great writer. In essence, the focus is on putting language under the microscope to arrive at a deeper understanding of it (hence the word 'Forensic').

Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12 will be partaking in the program for one hour a week where they will utilise their reading skills to examine a range of texts. The program will be delivered as part of our students' curriculum offer and will be a timetabled lesson. There are six strands to the programme which include: Women, Suffrage and Misogyny; The Spirit of Life; Fragile Earth; Journeys and Futures; The Plates of Global Power and Secrets and Lies.

The programme will be delivered by teachers from across different subject specialisms in support of the importance of literacy across the curriculum. 
