Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers

A very happy Easter to you!

Easter is a time for reflection and new beginnings. I have just walked around our College site with Mr Neville Coles, the Director of Education for WeST and along our walk, we have encountered many staff and students, all of whom have been wonderfully polite, courteous and industrious in their classrooms.

We've had glorious work showcased and read out to us and have seen children immersed in writing, discussion, technology and the creation of glorious pieces of art work. It gave me pause to reflect on how proud I am of all our young people and their collective endeavour and kindness.

I also approach this next term with excitement. I recently attended an online event for all of the 239 schools who were selected by the Department for Education as part of the 'Schools Rebuilding Project'. As I'm walking around the College, I am always impressed by the work happening in lessons, but it's increasingly hard to ignore the woeful state of some of the buildings. So, I was both relieved and delighted when I heard that we had been shortlisted for the project. I was informed at the webinar that there were thousands of entries for consideration and that schools have been selected based on three fundamental criteria: Laingspan (a building design that uses concrete and steel and is reaching the end of its natural life span), Intergrid (essentially the inner core of the building and its construction) and RAAC (a type of concrete used in roofing). Many school buildings of a certain age will have been constructed in this way, which may now lack some structural integrity and in addition to these three factors, the department have also considered the general condition of buildings.

The project could take up to five years to complete and we still don't know the scale of the project, but I have been advised that we will receive this information in June/July this year. The Department for Education funds all of the project from design stage to completion, so it won't remove any funding or resource from the classroom.

I'm sure you are excited to hear more, as am I. Not long to wait now and I will of course update you as soon as I am able to.

Wishing you a wonderful, relaxing break with your families, that hopefully contains a plentiful supply of chocolate eggs!
