

Attendance matters!

Everyone is aware of the importance of attending school regularly. But what does "regularly" mean? If you achieve 90% in an assessment, you'd likely be really proud of yourself. However, 90% attendance means you are absent on average for one day every single fortnight throughout the year. Not many employers would accept that without good reason.






Sometimes it can be helpful to break down attendance percentages into what this means in practice, for example:

	Short term impact	In a year	In a school career
100%	Full attendance	190 days learning	Full attendance
97%	Good Attendance – this is the target for Callington Community College		
95%	Half a day off per fortnight	2 weeks learning lost	10 weeks learning lost
90%	A day off each fortnight	A month's learning lost	Over half a year's learn- ing lost
85%	A day and a half off each fortnight	Nearly half a term's learning lost	The equivalent of miss- ing Year 11
80%	A day off a week	Over half a term's learning lost	A full year's learning lost

In terms of the impact poor attendance has on outcomes, we can look at real (anonymised) data from our Year 11 cohorts in previous years; where Strong Basics represents the percentage of students achieving a Grade 5 and above in English and Maths:

What can I do as a parent?

- Ensure that your Son/Daughter arrives at school on time each day; by 8:25 am at the latest ready for registration at 8:30 am.
- Ensure that your Son/Daughter only misses school for reasons which are unavoidable or justified, such as illness or days of religious observance
- Notify the College attendance officer on each day of any absence
- Talk to the College if you are concerned that Son/Daughter may be reluctant to go to school

Support from the College

Your Son/Daughter's tutor should be your first point of call with any attendance concerns. They are supported by the Heads of Year and Pastoral Support Assistants.

Mr Rob Taylor is the College Attendance lead and also works with the families of pupils who are presenting with Emotional Based School Avoidance (EBSA), mental health concerns or are otherwise reluctant to attend.

From Sept 2023 we are delighted that we will also be supported by an Education Welfare Officer who is employed by Westcountry Schools Trust. This will give us additional capacity to carry out home visits and to offer support to families who are struggling to ensure their children attend regularly.



Roman Baths Trip



On Friday 16 June, 25 of our most dedicated Year 10 Latinists participated in a trip to the ancient Roman Thermae of Bath (also known as the Roman Baths). Once the site of one of the great religious spas of the ancient world; the people of Roman Britain came to Bath to worship the goddess Sulis Minerva and bathe in the waters of the natural thermal springs, which still flow with hot water today.

Our visit started with a masterclass delivered by a specialist in the subject and our students had the chance to translate real ancient inscriptions from Roman tombs to learn more about the inhabitants of this city more than 2000 years ago; from soldiers that had travelled all the way from Belgium, to powerful and influential political figures, our students navigated the Latin written in these inscriptions and were able to decipher their contents. They also had the chance to interact with real

archaeological objects and explore a normal day in a Roman Bathhouse.

After this fantastic introduction, students visited the actual archaeological site and could explore in detail its history and admire their impressive statues and buildings.

One student said "I am glad we did this trip as it has helped me put into context what we have been learning in the lessons!"

An excellent experience where students made our College proud.
