Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers

This is the first school that I have worked in that has the word 'Community' in its title. It is one of the things that most interested me about the school when I was looking for my first headship.

Community is defined as 'a unified body of individuals'. I like this definition and the value of a united stance. We are united in wanting the best academic outcomes for young people, we are united in wanting our young people to achieve their personal goals, hopes and ambitions and we are united against those behaviours which divide and cause mental and physical harm. I have been delighted with everyone's response to the first term. There is a real sense of purpose from both the students and staff, which is demonstrated through effortful work in class, a disruption free environment and the increased participation with homework. There is, as always, still more to do here. Mr Taylor has spoken to students in assemblies this term about the term S.T.A.R. This is an acronym that exemplifies strong learning behaviours: S = Sit up straight, T = Track the speaker, A = pay Attention and R = Respect the speaker. We will fully introduce this in the new term. Of course, most students fully align with this already and consistently demonstrate exemplary manners and conduct. But we need consistency across the College and we need to ensure that the small minority who do not always observe these expectations, are reminded of them consistently and hence, any potential disruption to learning is eliminated. This unified position on classroom environments ultimately supports all learners, but in particular, those with identified needs also.

In addition to quality teaching and learning, we also do our best to exploit opportunities that enhance students' social and cultural skills too. Schools are much more than examination outcomes and as such, I observed with great delight this week, children getting absorbed in Hello Yellow activities, festooned in yellow clothing. A particular highlight was the wellbeing walk at the end of the day. And then of course, there was Harry Potter Day. We had over 70 attendees to our movie event at the end of the day and I can genuinely say that I enjoyed the movie as much as they did! It was a real privilege to share the experience with so many of our young people, whose behaviour was exemplary throughout.

We have a further event coming up after half term. As students return to us on Halloween, we will be holding a spooky disco in the main hall during second break. There will be prizes for students and staff strutting their best stuff! We look forward to seeing students participating in the fun. Friday 17 November will be Children in Need day and we will be releasing further details about this event just after half term.

Two Moors Way Challenge


Recently, Lowenna W (Year 8) took part in the final leg of the Two Moors Way Challenge with 1st Stoke Climsland Scout Group.

What is Disciplinary Reading?

Mrs Lamb has been working with curriculum leaders in the last few months on understanding and developing disciplinary reading in all subjects.

The EEF suggests that 'every teacher communicates their subject through its own unique language, and that reading, writing, speaking and listening are at the heart of knowing, doing, and communicating Science, Art, History, and every other subject in secondary school.'

At CCC, we believe reading is at the heart of all we do, and that having the opportunity to regularly read high quality texts exposes students to new ideas, universal truths and a deeper, richer understanding of the world around them.

Mrs Ramwell, a WeST subject leader for Art, and our own Curriculum Lead for Creative Arts, has been looking for ways to incorporate disciplinary reading into her lessons. CCC artists need to read about other artists and understand what motivate them, they need to read the 'big ideas' behind art work

and link these with art they already know. To this end, Mrs Ramwell has this to say:

Since the introduction of DEAR time the Art department has extended the opportunity to look at the work of other artists and designers. We have also Fashion Food Recipes Travel Health & fitness forged stronger links with SMSC to encourage students to look more globally at creativity across time and place. Within our schemes of work we have selected a range of reading opportunities and embedded them into our lessons. In year 7 we have been looking at the work of David Hockney; he's a bit of an activist and stirs up some good conversations too. We have found a great article all about his visit to King Charles to collect his Order of Merit wearing a Saville Row suit and a pair of Crocs! Reading around our curriculum is a powerful tool to encourage enquiry,
