
his aspirations, his job and his hopes but also how he has been a victim of discrimination, inequality and hatred.


What are British Values?

Mandy: What do you love? Chocolate, sunshine, the sea, Michael Bublé and dogs, especially Dude my


Jack Russell. Something you've always dreamed of? Climbing Kilimanjaro!

There were eight talks in total and the students moved between all of the eight learning about how to find an apprenticeship, apprenticeships in a rural environment, the day to day detail of being an apprentice and how long an apprenticeship will normally take. They also had the chance to work with assessors and employers to find out what they will need to do once on an apprenticeship. One Year 11 described it as the "best two hours for years" while all the guest speakers were full of praise for the focus, hard work and intelligence of the students.








Science - figuring things out is better than making stuff up!
