

# You've got to be in it, to win it!

Here at Callington Community College we are very focused on ensuring our attendance figures are as good as possible. Our overall school attendance target is 97%. Every single student contributes towards this and lots of little absences can have a very big effect. Every school day counts. For example, did you know:

Evidence shows that missing only 17 days of school can lead to a drop of ONE WHOLE GCSE GRADE in EVERY SUBJECT.

This also has an effect on how much money you earn as an adult. For example, leaving school with...

- Leaving with no qualifications will earn you approx. £7.44 per hour.
- Good GCSE qualifications will earn you approx. £9.02 per hour.
- Getting A-Level qualifications could earn you approx. £10.25 per hour.
- Achieving a University Degree could earn you approx. £15.01 per hour.

Many people think 90% attendance is good, but this means that...

- over just one school year it means you have missed HALF A DAY EVERY WEEK;
- over five years of secondary school it means HALF A YEAR has been missed.

Would an employer be happy if you were off work this much?

You will recall that a December Attendance competition was launched for 100% for the 14 days of December. In December 2017 418 students were recorded as 100% for the month of December - this year it is 528! Next week, Mrs P Mathieson will randomly select 2 students from Years 7 - 11 to receive a £15 Amazon voucher during assemblies.



In addition, 167 students have been awarded with a bronze award for 100% attendance during the Autumn Term. Students have received a lapel pin badge as well as a

certificate which were presented this week during assemblies.



# Bravery is to stand up for what you believe in!

We are so proud of Callum McGinley in Year 10 who recently wrote to various members of the Government requesting more Teaching Assistants for schools nationally.

My name is Callum McGinley and I am a student in Year 10 at Callington Community College. Unfortunately, due to problems when I was born, I was diagnosed with a form of cerebral palsy as well as being partially blind, partially deaf and with autism. As a result, I am on the blind register and as result of my disabilities I have a statement of special needs. To try and have a more normal childhood I am in a normal secondary school. However, I have difficulty when walking to my lessons due to the large number of pupils and my inability to see clearly. Like many schools in the UK at present there appear to be a lack of Teaching Assistants.



I am one pupil and I am sure there are many more that are in similar situations to myself. If *there were more Teaching Assistants* I would be able to move more confidently around the College and I feel that I would be able to learn more throughout my lessons with the support I require. I hope to go on to further education; but I need help and support to get me there I hope that this raises some awareness as to the importance of Teaching Assistants in schools.


