A meal with a difference

10SO sat down to a lunch with a difference this week. Inspired by a member of the tutor group, and after hearing about living with a visual impairment, we decided to get involved in October's Blindness Awareness month activities and have a blindfold meal together. Plans began last week with a crucial decision – what would we eat?! The popular favourite was pizza which Mrs Walker from the canteen kindly made for us and then it was simply a case of finding enough blindfolds to ensure all 16 of us were suitably 'blinded'.

It turned out to be an interesting experience not only in terms of opening our eyes to the truth about how much we rely on sight but also an insight into who is the loudest in our tutor group – not that we were really in much doubt! While it was clear we were all having a good time, students also acknowledged afterwards that they had felt quite disorientated to start off with. 'I felt really self-conscious', said one while another described the sensation as 'disconcerting'.

'I didn't really realise how much I relied on my sight. I couldn't even appreciate the food the way I normally do.' We agreed a lot of the time, the anticipation of an enjoyable meal to come begins when you see the food headed your way and without sight we were suddenly relying on touch and smell which somehow didn't satisfy in the same way.

On the other hand, the heightened awareness of the other senses and of hearing and touch in particular, was quite revelatory to some of us. We had to be much more careful in our movements, from passing food to pouring juice from a jug - there ended up being a bit of mopping up going on!

'I felt like you became more aware of people's personalities coming through in their voices,' said one student while another talked about how they found it harder to communicate because they couldn't see the facial expressions and body language of others.

Hopefully, sharing this experience with others will help raise awareness of what partially sighted and blind people have to deal with every day. With a number of partially sighted students in the school, it is imperative that we all have sensitivity and understanding as one of these students explains here: 'I'm 14yrs old and living with sight loss. Being a teenager is hard enough, but when you have a visual impairment too it makes life even harder. People should try and be aware of other people's needs - things as simple as turning a light switch on or moving an obstacle out of the way. There are many types of vision problems and not all of them are outwardly visible.

Be considerate. Be kind. It could be you.' **Mrs S Olsson**

Pirate FM reported that 15-year-old Hagan Williams' family have told them he managed to hold him and keep him calm.

The Callington Community College's student's Great Aunty, Rena Barnes, said they did not want his bravery to go unnoticed. "This was my 15 year old great nephew, Hagan Williams who held tight to the man and calmly talked him out of it. He is such a hero! His

mum is Max Williams and is such a very proud mum right now. "Hagan feels that he did nothing but I think he deserves to be put through for a bravery reward". "Biased or not he deserves recognition for his actions".

Rena came forward after Liskeard Police posted an appeal on their Facebook page, to thank everyone involved.

The performance and goal of the day came from the development team. The driving run, silky skills and calm finish of Kasper was the pinnacle of a performance from all 9 young men. Mr Hazeldine and Mr Piper proudly said "all 29 players were a credit to the College and the new football academy. Their behaviour was exemplary and this was matched with their attitude and team work." It was particularly pleasing to see Erin O'Shea play in the cup squad and put in a match winning performance. **Football is a sport for all.**

Top Tips for Young People at Halloween



Cornwall Fire & Rescue Service have issued some advice to ensure that Halloween is a happy and safe time for everyone, whether young or old. Here is their advice (for parents/carers and students) on how to have an enjoyable and safe Halloween. **Tips for students include:**

- Always be accompanied by an adult when you are trick-or-treating.
- You should only go to houses of people that you know and who are happy for you to call.
- Stay safe, keep to places that you know and are well lit.
- Do not take short cuts through gardens, alleyways or parks.
- Watch out for traffic - drivers might not see you.
- If you are wearing a mask make sure that you can see where you are going and are aware of your surroundings.
- Carry a torch and a fully charged mobile phone (if you have one).

Tips for parents: The safest way for children to celebrate Halloween is by going to an organised party. Lots of children like to go trick-or-treating at Halloween. It is recommended that they always go out in groups and younger children should be

accompanied by an adult. Older children should agree with parents/carers exactly where they are going and if possible which houses they intend to visit. It is likely to be dark outside – make sure they have torches and only walk down well-lit streets.

If your children have a mobile phone make sure they take it with them and check in at regular intervals to let you know all is well. Agree in advance a time when they will be back home and make sure one of them has a watch. Make sure your children know not to enter anyone's house and not to accept lifts in people's cars. Talk through the idea of trick or treat, and make sure your children are aware that some people do not want to be visited on Halloween.

Ask your children not to eat any sweets or other goodies that they have been given until they get home. Giving them a meal or snack before they go might help them resist temptation! Carefully check all the things your children have been given. Sweets and food that are still in their original wrappers are safest.




