There are some things we only learn in a storm!

There have been real storms and media storms over the last few weeks. Thankfully the College buildings have remained unaffected by the likes of 'Dennis, Ciara and now Jorge' and we have all managed to remain warm and dry. The Coronavirus has also caused some conversation around the College (and not just in DEAR time in Science!) and we have been mindful to maintain a calm and measured approach to this. We have followed all the necessary guidance and as stated in my letter to you all, good hygiene remains the best prevention and in addition, we have purchased hand sanitisers and boxes of tissues that will be distributed to teachers, who will deploy them as necessary for coughs and sneezes. Should you have any concerns at all, the best approach is to contact NHS 111 who will provide up to the minute guidance and reassurance.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank those parents in Year 7 who completed the home learning survey for us. Your feedback is really useful in helping us to refine and improve our systems. 57.6% of respondents were happy with the amount of work being set with 54.6% thinking the amount set should stay the same or increase and 57.6% believed that home learning was being completed in a reasonable amount of time. We are going to refine our mechanisms so that only one subject can set per evening (excluding Saturdays and Sundays), that a reasonable time frame is considered – 45 minutes being the most likely and that students are rewarded more often for their efforts and receive useful feedback. We will also, for future years, ensure a transition period occurs in their first few weeks with us, permitting only maths and English to set work initially.

Finally, I would like to alert you to an event we are planning for the last day of this term, Friday 27 March. You will be aware from my previous messages, that I believe that reading widely is transformative and a greater vocabulary has startling effects on outcomes. I would, as ever, encourage you to read with your family and engage them in reading as many texts as possible. To this end, we are hosting on Friday 27 March, a 24-hour sponsored readathon! We are seeking the involvement of students in joining us until Saturday morning at 8.30am in our library where we will engage in the pleasure of reading, with a mixture of quiet reading, listening to stories and reading and watching old favourites like Jackanory. Drinks and snacks will be provided throughout the event and all students need is a good book, a sleeping bag and a pillow and a keenness to raise as much sponsorship as possible. We will use the proceeds raised to buy more books and seating for our library. Further details and sponsorship forms will be sent out in the next few weeks and the event will be limited to a maximum number of 30 students. In the meantime, if you have any reading books of good quality that may have found their way otherwise into a local charity shop, particularly non-fiction texts, please drop them off to our reception and we will add them gratefully to our collection. The aim of the scheme is to increase students' aspirations and support the transition into STEM subjects at University and beyond by introducing links between schools and Universities.

Recently we have had the pleasure of a visit from the University of Plymouth Medical School staff and students. Some of our prospective medics from Year 11 and 12 had the amazing opportunity to discuss the pathways into medicine and talk to some of the current medical students about what to expect.

Other Callington students discussed how to apply to university, student finances and talk to students who had successfully been though GCSE and A-level exams. Callington students now have access to personal tuition support throughout the University application process, links with academics and a much greater insight into the Science opportunities available to them.

On 7 February 1812, Charles Dickens was born. Charles Dickens is remembered as one of the most influential writers of the 19th century. He was a novelist, journalist, editor, illustrator and social commentator and is most known for his classic novels, Oliver Twist, A Christmas Carol and The Tale of Two Cities.

The name 'Dickens' was apparently cursed. In The Merry Wives of Windsor by William -Shakespeare, instead of saying, 'What the devil?' as a profanity, people said, 'What the dickens?'. Charles Dickens had 10 children with Catherine Hogarth and gave them all strange nicknames, such as 'Skittles', 'Lucifer Box' and 'Chickenstalker'.

In 1865, he was involved in a rail crash. Being in the only first class carriage which didn't run off the tracks, Charles Dickens went to help many other wounded passengers.

He was very interested in paranormal activity and was a member of The Ghost Club. Charles Dickens has appeared on the British £10 note.

Curling at Callington Community College




On Thursday 13 February, as the students prepared to leave for the half term break, some of the College teachers ventured to the Main Hall for this year's Curling Championships.
